Some demands dropped

Teachers vote 'no' to strike

Angry and confused Berkeley teachers have decided against an immediate strike for higher wages, after being forced to vote using two conflicting ballots because of a split between their 1975-76 contract negotiators.

The teachers are accept-

ing all contract improvements already agreed upon, and want their negotiators to return to the table in an effort to obtain a salary hike at least contingent up to eight percent.

It was understood that the Board of Education, at 11th-hour bargaining, held to its offer of five percent contingent upon unpredictable factors, while the teachers dropped their demand for a "firm 10 percent," switching to a "contingent up to eight percent."

The strike threat is postponed indefinitely, but it is still there.

More than 500 teachers

were at first restless and then shouting mad yesterday afternoon, waiting 90 minutes in their seats in the auditorium of King Junior High while negotiations continued hot-and-heavy at the school district building on Walnut Street.

Negotiators of the Certificated Employee Council finally arrived, dead-tired from an all-night session which lasted until 5:30 a.m. and a day-long session which delayed the mass meeting almost until dinner-time.

The crowd was in no mood for speeches, but chief CEC

Laetrile 'worthless' says test

SAN DIEGO (AP) — An expert says the drug laetrile has shown after two years of tests to be worthless in fighting cancer.

It fails to inhibit the growth of a tumor or prolong life, he says.

The view was expressed by Dr. Lewis Thomas, president of the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Clinic in New York, which has been conducting animal experiments with the controversial drug, derived from distilled apricot pits.

Details of the study will be published within the next few weeks, Thomas said in an interview. He declined details.

Thousands of cancer victims are attracted annually to clinics in Tijuana, because their life is illegal in the United States.

The interview with Thomas was published in yesterday's editions of the San Diego Evening Tribune.

School fine for administrators

A \$26,000 fine has been levied against the Berkeley Unified School District by the California Department of Education for having too many administrators.

The figure is up sharply from last year's \$12,000 fine for the same charge.

However, Superintendent Laval Wilson's staff is seeking a "waiver" of the fine, arguing that the district is forced to designate new administrators when it accepts federal or state grants for special programs.

On the district's payroll are at least 15 administrators who are required by federal or state directives, according to Business Services Director Bill Thomas.

If levied, the \$26,000 fine would penalize the district

for having 10 too many administrators.

Actually Berkeley schools have 13 excess administrators but there is an automatic "hardship" waiver covering three administrators.

The waiver application covering 13 staff members is being sent to Richard Seiszler, director of the Bureau of Apportionments, California Department of Education, Sacramento.

Thomas said the 13 excess staff members is based upon the state formula allowing eight administrators per 100 teachers.

Actually, Berkeley schools have 81 administrators and 838 teachers.
